## A new NEWW newsletter

First of all, happy new year, and let us hope it will be a particularly productive one for our collaboration! As we enter the third year of our (formalized) network and its accompanying NEWW newsletter this January, our newsletter is set to change somewhat in purpose and content. This is because, as of October, a long-held need of ours was met with the creation of a NEWW discussion list: many thanks to Agnese Fidecaro for her work in making this possible! Henceforth, we would ask you to post news of general interest (publications, calls for papers) on the discussion list, and to use the newsletter for news more focused specifically on our own NEWW group activities and member news. Because of this development, we will no longer include the sections "Other publications of interest", "Other calls for papers" and "Other upcoming meetings and events" in the newsletter.

## **NEWW project news**

The past few months have been particularly busy ones. Most importantly, we spent them (among preparing a COST other things) grant preproposal, which was accepted, and then a full proposal which we submitted in January. This grant, if we receive it (we expect to hear back from the COST offices in May), will allow us to finance a number of yearly meetings. coordinated by four or five work groups, in order to prepare a full European-scale project and to set up the network that will carry out the research. Although a limited number of NEWW members were involved in the actual proposalwriting, the point of COST is to expand the present group and to create the appropriate structures for a long-term project, so please do start reflecting on what your own role could be within this more structured research network!

Another European financing scheme we might want to consider is the HERA Joint Research Programme (HERA JRP). A call has been launched for transnational Collaborative Research Projects (CRPs) in two humanities research areas: "Cultural Dynamics: Inheritance and Identity" and "Humanities as a Source of Creativity and Innovation". This does not apply to all of us: only 13 national funding partners have created this new transnational funding mechanism. The countries in question are Austria, Croatia, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Iceland, Ireland, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, Slovenia, Sweden and the United Kingdom. Succesful proposals will require the building of consortia of three or more partners based in three or more different HERA JRP countries. Please visit the HERA website at www.heranet.info, and try to find out if the research you are planning in the context of NEWW could be interesting to carry out in a group of researchers working in 3 to 5 countries.

In November, in Utrecht, we held the second annual NEWW November meeting, organized in collaboration with the Dutch graduate school Huizinga Instituut. The theme of this workshop was Literary Historiography and the 'Other'. Speakers included doctoral student Hanneke Boode, who addressed the reception of the Hungarian novelist Margit Kaffka; Hilde Hoogenboom, who talked about the early modern and 19th-century tradition of lists of Zsuzsanna famous women: Varga. who Hungarian discussed women's literary historiography; Anna van Buul, who discussed the work she did on the database during the past year; and Monica Soeting, whose talk focused on the biographical topos of "the first woman in history who..."(wrote for a living, whose works were widely read, etc.)

Finally, the executive committee (Suzan van Dijk, Agnese Fidecaro, Anke Gilleir and Alicia Montoya) met again in November in Utrecht, together with Hilde Hoogenboom, where they prepared upcoming NEWW events, including the third annual NEWW conference, to be held in May 2009 in Bochum. In addition, they worked on the COST proposal submitted in January, and on putting together the forthcoming NEWW volume *Women Writing Back / Writing Back Women*, scheduled for publication in 2009 by Brill.

## **NEWW discussion list**

## Upcoming NEWW events

On May 15-16, the third annual NEWW conference, entitled *Theorizing Narrative Genre* and Gender, will be held at the Ruhruniversität Bochum. Key-note lectures will be given by Joan DeJean (University of Pennsylvania) and Vera Nünning (University of Heildelberg). The programme is available online at the project site: www.womenwriters.nl (in: Conferences etc.). The day before the conference, on Thursday May 14, a NEWW meeting will be held in order to discuss continuing research together, new projects for upcoming events to be organized, etc. On Sunday the 17th, a touristic programme is scheduled. NB: Bochum and the Ruhr region have been designated a "Cultural Capital of Europe" for the year 2010.

## **Database news**

The database *WomenWriters* at present (January 20, 2009) contains 18,410 records concerning the reception of women's literary works before 1900; of these, 13,613 concern the Dutch reception.

All NEWW members are invited to enter any of their own data that may be of interest to colleagues. Please contact <u>Suzan van Dijk</u> to obtain a password, instructions for use, and (if needed) support by telephone or E-mail. It is important that "new" users experiment and comment on the user-friendliness of the tool. Their feedback will be important in discussions about perfecting and upgrading the database. The companion website, *Women Writers' Networks* (<u>www.womenwriters.nl</u>), aims to provide, in addition to the information already listed, a bibliography of works on women writers within a transnational perspective, which should be relevant to all of us. ## **Member profiles**

Katja Mihurko Poniž (1972) has a Ph.D. in feminist theory and women's studies from the University of Ljubljana. She is the author of Drzno drugačna. Zofka Kveder in podobe ženskosti (Daringly different. Zofka Kveder and the images of femininity), Ljubljana: Delta, 2003, and the editor of Zbrana dela Zofke Kveder (The collected works of Zofka Kveder), vol. 1, Maribor: Litera, 2005. Her articles on Slovenian women writers have appeared in prestigious international Slovenian and publications, as well as in A biographical dictionary of women's movements and feminisms *in Central, Eastern, and South Eastern Europe : 19th and 20th centuries,* Budapest; New York: CEU Press/Central European University Press, 2006, which she she co-edited with F. de Haan, K. Daskalova and A. Loufti.

Irene Zanini-Cordi holds a Laurea in Lingue e Letterature straniere (English and Czech) from the Università di Venezia Ca' Foscari. In 2004 she earned a Ph.D. in Italian Studies from the University of California, Berkeley. She has held lecturer positions at UC Berkeley and UC Santa Cruz. Since August 2005 she has been an Assistant Professor of Italian in the Department of Modern Languages and Linguistics at Florida State University. Professor Zanini-Cordi's areas of specialization are Renaissance and contemporary Italian literature, with emphasis on Narrative and Critical Theory, the novella and the novel, Feminist Theory and women's writing. She has published on Elena Ferrante, Ariosto and Cristina Trivulzio di Belgiojoso. Her first book, on the figure of the abandoned woman in Italian literature, is entitled Donne sciolte. Abbandono ed identità femminile nella letteratura italiana (Ravenna: Longo, 2008). Her current book project and interests focus on 18th and 19<sup>th</sup> century Italian literature, in particular on the women who animated Italian salotti di cultura and literary salons from the second half of the 18th century to the unification of Italy (1860s), and their influence on the birth of the Italian Nation.
