NEWW project news

The big NEWW project news is of course the <u>COST Action</u> starting next month. The Action is entitled: "Women Writers in History: Toward a New Understanding of European Literary Culture", and will take place from 2009 – 2013. Research carried out by NEWW members will be allowed to reinforce collaboration and to reach out to new colleagues in countries not included up to now. As the NEWWsletter planned for last July had to be postponed, we can now welcome those new NEWW members who are joining us thanks to COST.

We will meet some of them during the first meeting of the COST Management Committee, which is to take place in Brussels on 1 and 2 October. MC members have been invited by the Brussels COST Office.

Executive Committee

In May and July, the NEWW Executive Committee (Agnese Fidecaro, Anke Gilleir, Alicia Montoya and Suzan van Dijk) met in Geneva and The Hague, where they discussed in particular the continuation of the NEWW network, made possible by the COST Action. They decided that most of the tasks of the Executive Committee might be taken over by the COST Management Committee, provided MC members will agree. However, if any of you is interested in taking responsibilities, for example for editing this NEWWsletter, she (he) will be very welcome.

The Executive Committee also decided that NEWW members would be asked to pay a small financial contribution for receiving the NEWWsletter, for membership of the NEWW list and for having the possibility of acquiring a password for the database *WomenWriters*. This will also be discussed during the COST MC meeting. We will inform you in the next NEWWsletter.

The Committee members (in particular Anke Gilleir and Alicia Montoya) also worked on the finalizing of the forthcoming NEWW volume *Women Writing Back / Writing Back Women*, scheduled for publication in 2010 by Brill, Leiden.

Third NEWW conference

The third international NEWW conference has taken place at the Ruhr-Universität Bochum on May 15-16, organized by Lieselotte Steinbruegge and Suzan van Dijk. 22 papers have been presented; two keynote addresses were given by Joan DeJean (University of Pennsylvania) and Vera Nünning (University of Heidelberg). The programme is still visible on the NEWW website.

The day before the Bochum conference, on Thursday May 14, a NEWW meeting has been held in order to discuss continuing research together.

At present, work on the proceedings has started: most of the texts have already been received. Thank you very much!

New collaborative research proposal

In April, an Outline Proposal to the HERA Joint Research Programme "Cultural Dynamics: Inheritance and Identity" had been submitted; in June we have been invited to develop it into a full proposal. The project entitled: "Writing In Female Europe (WIFE). Women's authorship in peripheral cultures: participation in supranational 19th-century developments" has been indeed further developed and submitted on September 1.

This research will concern women's literature of the large 19th century for five "smaller" countries: Denmark, Hungary, the Netherlands, Spain. Researchers implied are: Slovenia, Zsuzsanna Annemarie Mai, Varga, Katja Mihurko, Henriette Partzsch, Lizet Duyvendak and Suzan van Dijk. End of December we will be informed about the outcome. In case the project will be financed, it will be interesting to establish cooperation with colleagues working on other "small" countries. We invite those of you who are concerned to think about it and take contact.

Events

A meeting has taken place in Lisbon, July 13 and 14, between the group "Portuguese Women Writers" and Suzan van Dijk representing NEWW. Organized by Vanda Anastacio and Teresa de Almeida, it intended to create and reinforce collaboration between Portuguese researchers working on women's writing and literary history, concerning Portugal as well as Brasil and other Lusophone countries. This meeting was very fruitful and constituted in fact an example of the usefulness of, also, trying to collaborate on the national level, considering COST MC or WG members as "representatives" of national groups.

NEWW November meeting

In collaboration with Huizinga Institute (Amsterdam, Doctoral school in cultural history) and Huygens Institute (The Hague), NEWW will again organize in November a one-day workshop addressing in particular (but not exclusively) PhD-students, who are invited to present (parts of) their work.

This year the theme will be: *Quantitative methods in cultural history*. Keynote speaker will be : Franco Moretti (author of *Atlas of the European Novel, 1800-1900* (1998) and *Graphs, Maps, Trees: Abstract Models for a Literary History* (2005)). He will present an introduction entitled: « Network Theory, Plot Analysis ». Other speakers : Madeleine Jeay (McMaster University) and Joris van Zundert (Huygens Institute The Hague).

The recent "creative turn" in translation studies has challenged notions of translation as a derivative and uncreative activity which is inferior to "original" writing. Commentators have drawn attention to the creative processes involved in the translation of texts, and suggested a rethinking of translation as a form of creative writing. Hence there is growing critical and theoretical interest in translations undertaken by literary authors. This conference focuses on acts of translation by creative writers.

Keynote speakers: Susan Bassnett, David Constantine, Lawrence Venuti.

Proposals are invited for individual papers (max. 20 minutes) or panels (of 3 speakers). The conference language is English. It is anticipated that selected papers from the conference will be published. Keynote speakers: Norbert Bachleitner (Vienna), Magdalene Heuser (Osnabrück/Berlin), Susanne Kord (London).
